## **What we have been doing**

As your local council we have continued to maintain and improve valuable services to the community, including play park equipment, grass-cutting / hedge clearing (we pay MCC to do this), emptying of dog waste bins, responding as a consultee to planning applications, and helping residents to access services from MCC. We have also continued to maintain the Rogiet Hub (Pavilion) building, which provides facilities for several local organisations: Little Tigers Daycare, MonLife Youth Club, and Severn Tunnel Football Club.

We have recently repaired and improved the external lighting on the pavilion building, plus commissioned various internal inspections and carried out follow-up actions to ensure conformity with applicable regulations (fire, lighting, gas, legionella, etc).

We have improved our CCTV provision by adding a new external camera to protect the playing fields car park and its boundary with the allotments. Overall, we have been very pleased to see that there has been little vandalism in the protected areas since we commissioned the CCTV system and put up our signage.

Another tangible improvement has been the repair and upgrade to the lighting in the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA). We have replaced the old and mostly broken lamps with brand new state-of-the-art LED equivalents. Over the coming months we will be looking at ways to promote the MUGA to sports organisations and residents, to make best use of our investment.

Other examples of things we have done in and around the village: reinstatement of one dog waste bin following a review of the provision; support to various community groups, including Rogiet Community Junction and Rogiet Wildlife Friendly Village; maintenance of defibrillators; provision of Christmas trees and lighting; purchase of remembrance wreaths; and organisation of the annual outdoor remembrance service.

Also, for the summer season, we have cleared and re-planted four of the village's wooden planters and also the stone troughs by the memorial. (We have kept the wooden planters going for another year but next year we intend to replace with self watering ones, similar to those in Magor).

As well as all the above, we have managed the routine activities of running the council as a corporate body: controlling the finances (budget, precept, payment of staff, payment of invoices for services, day-to-day banking, etc); managing policies, staff, council meetings, social media, and so on.

From all of us at RCC, we wish you all a very pleasant summer.

## **Our future plans**

A few months ago we submitted a response to MCC's Active Travel proposals for the B4245, in which we included improved crossings, and better lane markings on the Llanfihangel bends. This was received positively; and we continue to monitor.

We continue to keep a close eye on the proposed developments to STJ Station and access from the B4245 and M48. We will continue to participate actively in any meetings related to the Local Development Plan (RLDP), including raising the concerns regarding the lack of infrastructure. Alongside this we will continue to lobby to get a crossing placed nearer to

the Rogiet petrol station garage to provide safer crossing there. We will also continue to press for a resolution to the on-street commuter parking problems.

Our Five-Year Plan continues, albeit slowly, owing to other pressures. The Plan will shape our strategic vision on important topics such as energy conservation, climate change and maintaining our green spaces, including the green belt between Rogiet and Caldicot.

For this coming summer of 2024, we have planned some councillor surgeries, where residents can come to speak to us about their concerns and learn more about what we actually do, and how they can report faulty street lights, potholes, overgrown footpaths and other things that we do not control. We are hoping to invite along MCC Officers and other agencies. Any further suggestions would be welcome.

Also for the summer we have decided to organise some free-to-use 'Stay and Play' sessions for the children, on four consecutive weeks in the school holidays. These sessions will be funded by RCC and provided by MCC's MonLife play team. Please see our lovely advertisement later in this booklet and also on our social media.

Finally, at the MUGA, the tennis nets and free racquets / balls are back!

## **Rogiet Hub - update**

In the last issue of Windmill Post, we announced that we were putting the Rogiet Hub project on 'pause', while we 'saved up' into our earmarked reserves and explored funding opportunities. We also said that we would look at ways to improve the current pavilion building—especially the provisions for the nursery setting but also to provide more facilities for the use by the community.

We have recently re-engaged our architect and instructed them to create feasibility designs for a refurbished pavilion. The main improvement points are:

- \* Retain facilities for the daycare provision, with some material improvements, such as a sleep room, plus all-weather cover for the external play area to the rear.
- \* Move the sports changing facilities to a new extension or outbuilding.
- \* Convert the space currently occupied by sports changing into a hireable community spaces, possibly divided with a flexible partition.
- \* Extend the kitchen space and convert it into shared usage (daycare / community).
- \* Provide office space for the Clerk.
- \* Improve the natural light throughout the building (more / deeper windows).
- \* Make the building more attractive and welcoming (new / improved entrances).


Overleaf we are pleased to show you what we have come up with. Our next step is to seek pre-application advice from MCC Planning. We hope to do this over the summer.

Currently a design / build budget has not been set. This will come later, when we have planning permission and the designs are matured to a more detailed level.

## D-Day 80th Anniversary Memorial Service

The D-Day or Normandy Landings were the landing operations and associated airborne operations on 6th June 1944 of the Allied invasion known as Operation Overlord during World War II.

The operation began the liberation of France and the rest of Western Europe, laying the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front and the beginning of the end of the Second World War.

A short service of commemoration to mark the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day landings was held at the Rogiet Memorial on Thursday 6th June at 2pm. It was well attended by councillors and residents. Also present were the head teacher, Mr Paul Hamer and several 'School Ambassador' pupils from Rogiet Primary School; and Peter & Julie Wilson and Bob Reid from the Royal British Legion.

The service was beautifully conducted by Reverend Gaynor Burritt. Poppy wreaths were laid by Cllr Phil Ellwood (RCC Chair), and by Cdr Bob Reid on behalf of the Royal British Legion. Cllr Beverly Cawley (RCC Vice Chair) read a bible passage, and Peter Bray played the Last Post and Reveille.

The service was followed by refreshments in the Pavilion, organised by Cllr Janet Fowler.

Rogiet Primary School kindly flew our special D-Day 80 commemoration flag for the week.



## **MUGA: new lighting, taster sessions and future hiring**

Over the past months, we have carried out repairs and upgrades to the lighting system in the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA).



Last year we arranged the replacement of the vandalised and weather-damaged timer control box and its enclosure. In March this year we had the defective and obsolete floodlight heads replaced with state-of-the-art LED equivalents.

In addition to the above, we have carried out general maintenance and cleaning on the kickboards and playing surface.

Now that we have made the necessary investment in the

equipment, especially the lighting, we would like to make the facilities available to the community, including in the dark evenings of autumn and winter.


Initially we are thinking of hosting free taster sessions in various activities, led by experienced coaches or club leaders, in the hope that interest may be generated quickly so we may then move to a regular hiring scenario.

Regular evening activities in the future could include five-a-side football, basketball, netball, tennis (we have a new net), circuit training, aerobics, and so on.

In order to do this, we will need help from the community in the form of:

- Coaches and club leaders to run taster sessions and, later, regular activities. As mentioned above, we would require the initial taster sessions to be run free to users, before any regular business-like club operations commence.
- Volunteer(s) to manage access to the MUGA and to put up / take down equipment.
- Volunteer(s) to manage the lighting control system. This would include the holding of timer tokens and / or override keys for the timer control box.

## A TRIUMPH OF FRIENDSHIP OVER WAR (article by Peter Strong)

*At this time of war and strife around the world—Ukraine, Palestine, Sudan and elsewhere—it is worth remembering that friendship can triumph over fear and hate, as this article from the South Wales Weekly Argus (3rd October 1974) shows:*

"It was a sentimental journey for West German Mr Wilhelm Trinter when he visited Rogiet for three weeks. The purpose was to see a friend he met over 29 years ago when he was a prisoner of war at Chepstow and Llanmartin. The friend, Mr Clifford Davies of Woodland View, was in charge of twenty prisoners of war who worked at Ifton Quarry. Mr Davies, who was a sergeant in the special police for 21 years, worked at the quarry as a fitter. Mr Trinter, from Thorwaldsenanlage, Wiesbaden, was a prisoner for four years. For three of them he worked at the quarry.

At one time the POWs from Chepstow lived in horseboxes at the racecourse, said Mr Davies. He fetched them every day in a lorry.

"I didn't trust them at first," he admitted. But after a while he began to give them cigarettes, bread, cakes and cotton, which they could not afford on their shilling a day pay. He attended Newport Technical College for night classes in German because, at first, the prisoners would not listen to him. "They used to say they could not understand me," he said.

The prisoners' job was to load stone into drams with shovels. "Although they were not forced to work they preferred that to staying in the camps," said Mr Davies. The quarry has now changed a great deal. It has become fully mechanised and the motorway runs through part of it, but Mr Trinter was eager to walk over the site where he used to work.

After the war, Mr Trinter, now 65, became a civil servant. He has a son, a daughter and two grandchildren. Mr Davies continued to work at the quarry until he retired in 1968

after 49 years. He has been to Germany five times to visit Mr Trinter. This was Mr Trinter's second visit to this country.

The friendship that began behind barbed wire has certainly stood the test of time. The other POWs have not forgotten Mr Davies either. Every Christmas he receives cards from eleven of them.

## Stay & Play Sessions - Summer 2024

**Playday** is the national day for play and is the biggest play sector event in the UK. As well as a celebration of children's right to play, Playday is a campaign that highlights the importance of play in children's lives being fundamental for children's enjoyment of childhood, and it is vital for their health, well-being and development. It is coordinated by Play England, in partnership with Play Wales in this country.

To celebrate Playday, Rogiet Community Council have arranged an exciting opportunity for four Stay & Play sessions, FREE to the community, to be held in and around the Pavilion; co-ordinated by Play Wales in collaboration with MonLife.


A massive thank you for your continued support over this academic year.

## Speeding and dangerous driving – if you see it, report it!

Over a century ago, in 1910, Rogiet Parish Council reported that there were complaints about traffic speeding in or through the village.

The problem continues today.

Although there are differing opinions on the 20mph limit in Rogiet, the majority of people recognise that lack of enforcement is a problem. Traffic going through the village at 40, 50, 60 m.p.h. or more is not acceptable and can be a danger to life and limb.

Responsibility for enforcement of speed limits in Wales rests with the Wales Road Safety Community Partnership, otherwise known as GoSafe. Amongst other things, GoSafe operates speed vans and mobile enforcement cameras (e.g. 'speed guns'). The mobile enforcement cameras can also identify drivers using mobile phones or failing to wear seatbelts.

Although there are no approved camera van sites in Rogiet, it is important that GoSafe is made aware of the speeding problems in the village because how and when GoSafe use cameras depends on the history and road safety problem at each location. They may be placed in areas where speeding is a concern or where there is a history of road casualties.

At present, GoSafe receives very few complaints about speeding in Rogiet. This may be because people are not aware of where to report incidents. Hopefully, this article will correct this.

You can also report incidents of dangerous driving to GoSafe and download relevant footage from a dashcam. This is often very helpful to police.



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
